SUB-452 shall be a course for students choosing a 4-year UG degree (Honours with Research).

SUB-453 & SUB-454 shall be practical courses for subjects with practical components.

SUB-453, SUB-454 & SUB-455 shall be advanced courses for students choosing a 4-year UG degree (Honours).

(b) A student shall be allowed to change minor courses to major courses or vice versa in the third semester only. Preference shall be given to those students who have no backlogs in the first and second semesters.

(c) A student shall be awarded a 3-year Bachelor's degree in single major if she/he has completed 120 credits with at least 5.0 grade points on the 10-point grading scale as per the minimum credit requirements in each course and semester of three-academic years (OC-8, 2023).

(d) A student shall be awarded a 3-year Bachelor's degree in a multidisciplinary programme, provided she/he has successfully completed 120 credits with at least 72 credits from core courses of three subjects, as specified under Clause 7 below, with equal credit distribution.

(e) A student securing at least 75% marks in aggregate on completion of the third-academic years shall be eligible for undertaking Honours with Research of a 4-year Bachelor's degree programme. Students securing less than 75% marks in aggregate shall be eligible for joining Honours only.

(f) The Colleges/Departments offering a 4-year Bachelor's degree (Honours with Research) shall be required to have the basic infrastructure, such as the library, access to journals, computer lab & software, laboratory facilities to conduct experimental research works, and at least two permanent faculty members who are recognized as PhD supervisors as per the University rules.

(g) A student shall be awarded a 4-year Bachelor's degree (Honours) in a major subject, provided she/he has completed 160 credits with at least 5.0 grade points on the 10-point grading scale as per the minimum credit requirements in each course and semester of four-academic years.

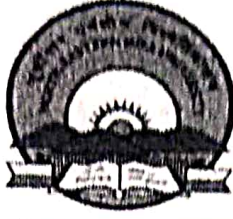
A student completing 160 credits with at least 5.0 grade points on the 10-point grading scale, including Research project/Dissertation of 12 credits, shall be awarded a 4-year Bachelor's degree (Honours with Research).

Students opting for a 3-year Bachelor's degree in a multidisciplinary Programme shall have the option to choose core courses offered by a major subject and any other two cognate subjects as per the subject-combination groups, wherever permissible, as

DEFINITIONS

Program: The program of study offered by NEIU; four-year undergraduate program (FYUP) in this case.

Discipline: The branches within a program of study. The FYUP is divided into five disciplines, *v/z.*, (i) Natural and Physical Sciences, (ii) Mathematics, Statistics, and Computer Applications, (iii) Library, Information, and Media Sciences, (iv) Commerce and Management, (v) Humanities and Social Sciences.

Subject: The divisions within a discipline are subjects. For example, Natural and Physical Sciences comprise of the subjects such as Biology, Botany, Zoology, Biotechnology, Biochemistry, Chemistry, Physics, Biophysics, Astronomy and Astrophysics, Earth and Environmental Sciences, etc.

Courses: Courses are basically the papers required to complete a program. For a 3-year UG degree, a student must earn 120 credit hours from at least 33 courses. A four-year UG program requires a total of 160 credit hours from 41 (Honors with research)/43 courses (Honors). Course number indicates the difficulty level of the course as shown below:

100 -101 = Introductory level courses

200 -201 = Intermediate level courses

300 -301 = High level courses

400-401 = Advance level courses

Credit: Weightage of a course with defined contact hours. A student must clear a course with a minimum P letter grade and 4 grade points to award the defined credits. A student with grade points ranging from 4 to 10 will earn the same credit for a given course. 40% of the credits in any category may be earned through online courses approved by the Board of Studies (BOS) as per the existing UGC regulations. No course with practicum can be earned online.

Discipline Specific Courses (DSCs): DSCs are core courses in a discipline. Basically, the major and non-vocational minor courses are discipline courses.

Major: The subject of main focus within a discipline where a student must earn 50% of the total credits of the program, i.e., 60 credit hours out of total 120 credit hours. The 60 credit hours in major includes 8 credit hours from introductory discipline specific courses.

Minor: A subject where a student earns 10% of the total credit hours (120/160 credits) of the program, i.e., 12/16 credit hours. Minor subject helps a student to gain a broader understanding beyond the major discipline. There will be two MINORS. The second MINOR must be on Vocational Education and Training which may be related to the major or minor subjects or choice of the student.

Honours: The subject of focus where a student must earn 92 credit hours in the subject out of total 160 credit hours of the program. The 92 credit hours in Honors includes 8 credit hours from introductory discipline specific courses. Only those students who secure a minimum of 75% marks in the MAJOR subject will be allowed to take Research

Project/Dissertation and will be awarded with "UG Honors with Research" upon securing the required credits. The remaining students must opt for advance courses to be awarded with a "UG Honors."

Honors with Research: An Honours with 92 credit hours in the subject including 12 credit hours from research project/dissertation (Ref. page 10).

Multidisciplinary Courses (MDCs): MDCs are introductory-level courses relating to any of the five broad disciplines. University has identified three courses from each broad disciplines under Multidisciplinary Courses to broaden the intellectual experience and form part of liberal arts and science education. Student cannot opt courses which were taken in their Class XII.

Skill Enhancement Courses (SECs): These courses are aimed at imparting practical skills, hands-on training, soft skills, etc., to enhance the employability of students. University has identified nine courses in total to achieve the stated objective.

Ability Enhancement Courses (AECs): Students are required to achieve competency in a Modern Indian Language (MIL) and in the English language with special emphasis on language and communication skills.

Value Added Courses (VACs): Understanding India, Environmental science/education, Digital and technological solutions, Health & Wellness, Yoga education, sports, and fitness.

Vocational Education and Training: A minor subject of the undergraduate programme aimed at imparting skills along with theory and practical.

Internship: All students will also undergo 8-weeks of internships / Apprenticeships in a firm, industry, or organization or Training in labs with faculty and researchers in their own or other Curriculum and Credit Framework for Undergraduate Programmes HEI/Research institutions during the summer/winter term.

Exam weightage: Marks distribution ratio between Periodic and End semester examination will be 1:4. In subjects having practical, both theory and practical components will be there in a course. Periodic evaluation marks will be awarded only for the theory component. In the End semester exam, provision for awarding internal marks (@10%) will be kept.

Change of Major: Generally, student will be able to exchange between the MAJOR and MINOR, if both the subjects fall within the broad discipline. Preference for MAJOR change will be given to those who have got highest CGPA with no arrears in the first year. Students opting to change the major in the 3rd semester to a subject other than the major and minor subjects opted for in the first year will have to clear the introductory level courses in the chosen subject in the 3rd/5th semester.

7.1. Letter Grades and Grade Points

The Semester Grade Point Average (SGPA) is computed from the grades as a measure of the student's performance in a given semester. The SGPA is based on the grades of the current term, while the Cumulative GPA (CGPA) is based on the grades in all courses taken after joining the programme of study.

The HEIs may also mention marks obtained in each course and a weighted average of marks based on marks obtained in all the semesters taken together for the benefit of students.
